With the 2018 announcement of reinvestment of \$291.2 million into the First Nations Policing Program (FNPP) over the next five years it provides an opportunity for First Nation communities to create long-term, sustainable police services as opposed to ineffective, short-term programs. The issues of funding, recruitment, span of control, civilian oversight, legal framework, and governance structure require a high-level of collaboration to cooperate in a major planning and implementation process. This session will explore solutions and give participants some tools and concepts to take back to their board and service.
